FORWARD

Connecticut's Western Reserve consisted of 3,000,000 acres of land in the northeast corner of the State of Ohio. Bordered by Lake Erie on the north, the 41st degree parallel on the south, Pennsylvania on the east, and Sandusky and Seneca Counties on the west. It extended 120 miles from east to west and averaged fifty miles from north to south. Cuyahoga County, a part of the Connecticut Western Reserve, was formed in 1810.

General Moses Cleaveland, a surveyor for the Connecticut Land Company, accompanied by a large party, landed at the mouth of the Cuyahoga River in 1796. They surveyed the site and planned the streets and lanes. The town which grew around it was first called Cuyahoga Town, but after September, 1796, it became known as Cleveland.

General Moses Cleaveland and the surveyors who worked with him, used the 41st parallel as their base line and worked north to Lake Erie marking meridians at five mile intervals. These areas constituted ranges, which were later subdivided into the following townships: Bedford, Brecksville, Brooklyn, Chagrin Falls, Dover, East Cleveland, Euclid, Independence, Mayfield, Middleburg, Newburg, Olmsted, Orange, Parma, Rockport, Royalton, Solon, Strongsville and Warrensville.

The land owners in the city of Cleveland do not appear on the 1852 map, therefore are not included in this index.

The index is an alphabetical listing of the names or initials of property owners living and owning property in the 19 townships and two towns surrounding the city of Cleveland, Ohio in 1852. You do not have to know the township name in order to find an ancestor. A quick check of the surname index will reveal his name as it appears on the map, the township, township number, tract, lot and acreage owned by the individual listed. Township maps are included and appear in the back of the index, thus giving you the opportunity to easily locate the property owned by an individual. The names adjacent may give you a clue for further search. The early settlers did not travel far from home and tended to marry within the area in which they lived.

This index has been carefully checked and meticulously proof read. All names, initials, and abbreviations listed in the index are exactly as they appear on the original map. A question mark indicates that a number or letter could not be deciphered or was questionable. Township, tract, lot, and acreage numbers were omitted when they did not actually appear on the original map.

The Index to the Cuyahoga County Landowner's Plat Map of 1852 was made possible through the combined efforts of the members of the Greater Cleveland Genealogical Society. The address is P. O. Box 9639, Cleveland, Ohio 44140.

The County lies between $41^{\circ} 18'$, and $41^{\circ} 39'$ North Latitude, and in $4^{\circ} 30'$, and $5^{\circ} 1' 15''$ West Longitude from Washington. It contains about 450 Square Miles, and 281,207 acres of Land exclusive of City Property. Population in 1852:— 54,000.

The first known white inhabitation within the Limits of the County was a French Station, supposed to have been in the south east corner of Brooklyn Township, as early as 1755, and the first permanent Settlement was made at Cleveland, in the autumn of 1796. In September and October, the Survey of a Town was made on the east bank of the Cuyahoga River, and named Cleveland in honor of Gen. Moses Cleveland of Canterbury, Conn.^t and settled by Job V. Stiles and family, and Edward Paine who where the only Persons that passed the Winter of 1796 & 7, whose lonely habitation was a log cabin, which stood near the site of the Commercial Bank.

During the Spring of 1799 Wheeler W. Williams, and Major Wyat erected a small grist and saw mill, at the falls of Mill Creek on the side of Newburg: this being the first mill on the Western Reserve.
