ORDINANCES PASSED. To establish the grade of Pleasant street; to lay out, open and extend North Woodland avenue; to grade, drain, pave and improve Pearl street between Monroe street and Walworth Run bridge; to repeal an ordinance passed July 14th, 1874; to lay out, open and extend Beach street.

THE SCHOONER BENSON. The Adventures of a Lake Craft that Went Across the Ocean. The Toledo Blade contains the following in regard to the schooner Benson, of which so much was said last summer:

Messrs. A. Andrews & Co. have received a letter dated Buenos Ayres, December 17th, 1874, from the captain of the schooner C. Benson, which states that the vessel had arrived there safely December 10th, with a cargo of 500 tons of coal, which she had taken on board at Newcastle-upon-Tyne September 15th.

It will be recollected that this little wanderer left this port on the 10th of May last, with a cargo of coal for Cork. Many were the assertions that she would never reach her destination, "because" she was so small and bringing her cargo in so good condition to unload. To the great surprise of the natives she started light (without ballast) for New Castle-upon-Tyne where she arrived in good condition. Here she had to go on the dry dock to be overhauled with zinc and make the necessary alterations and additions to be classified as an ocean going craft.

She was loaded with coal as stated above, and started across the ocean on her voyage. She will return immediately to Cork, bringing a large quantity of coal, and will probably return to the lakes in the fall.
