teresting account of the Dorcas Society work, from which the following is taken: An impression seems to prevail among some of our citizens that the Dorcas Society works independently of and in opposition to the Bethel, and this is a mistake that does the former society injustice. The ladies of the Dorcas Society are heart and soul with the managers of the latter charity, and lend their influence and support to the

mutual benefits of both. The following members of the Dorcas Society are also members of the board of managers and on ward committees of the Bethel, respectively; Mrs. J. A. Harris, Mrs. H. M. Little, Miss Joshua Ross, managers; Mrs. J. M. Richards, Mrs. Dr. Laisey, Mrs. Sanford, Mrs. W. C. North, and Mrs. M. H. Nyce, ward committee.

The Dorcas Society have a great many sick and afflicted people on their hands and their wants are very pressing and aid should be extended them by all who are charitably disposed. There has been more sickness and suffering this winter than during any previous year in the history of the city and the resources of the Dorcas Society have been taxed to their utmost to provide for all who call upon them for relief. The members of the society individually have done a great deal of work, devoted a large share of their time and freely given their means to the noble cause which they have interested themselves in and the general public should now come forward and assist them in their laudable efforts. The society has not hitherto been compelled to call upon the city at large for contributions, but their work has assumed proportions of such a magnitude as to render this necessary. We may say in this connection that the call for aid recently published in the LEADER met with a generous response and many contributions were given in support of the work. One gentleman very kindly contributed a cash donation of \$50, while others gave more or less largely according to their means. These supplies, however, are now exhausted, and the ladies feel under the necessity of again appealing to the community for assistance. The society has derived a considerable income from entertainments, but have not had had any lately, although we understand there is to be one given for its benefit in March. In the meantime the generosity of our citizens should prompt them to give the aid asked, for the work of the Dorcas Society is not sectarian, but its mission, extends among all classes and conditions. The sick and the poor are visited by its members, and where those little attentions which soothe the suffering of the afflicted are required, they are cheerfully given. A kind word and a tender interest shown to a patient are worth more than gallons of medicine, and help to relieve the tedious of ill ness, while they aid wonderfully in the overthrow of disease.


