

# Raywalt Grave One of Three to be Marked

Penn Yan, May 4 — Of the three graves of Revolutionary soldiers, to be marked, one will be the grave of John Raywalt.

Mr. Raywalt lived in the village of Lebanon, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. In the year of 1776 he enlisted in the flying camp in Pa. and was made a sergeant. July 1, 1777, he was made a lieutenant, and July 1, 1778, he was made a captain. From May, 1779, until May 1782, he served as Assistant Deputy Wagon Master General, and served under Robert

Patten, quarter master general. He was engaged in the battle of Bunker Hill; White Plains; Trenton, Bradywine, and a number of others. In the year of 1811 in the month of February, he moved to the town of Milo, Yates County. He died February 16, 1827.

The idea of marking the graves of the revolutionary soldiers, is that of the members of the local chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. The plan has received the approval of the people of the village and vicinity
