SEYMOUR WISHES MURPHY SUCCESS.

Governor-Elect and His Erstwhile Opponent Exchange Courtesies—Major Lentz Congratulated.

Newark, Nov. 7.—With the heat of political battle cooled or cooling, and time for reflection afforded those most interested in the exchange of courtesies and pleasantries between the victors and the vanquished, the things said in the excitement of the campaign have been forgotten and, although the Republican victory is but two days old, friendly relations have been re-established and congratulations from recent opponents are being received by the winners with as much modesty and kindly spirit as they are offered.

In the big pile of congratulatory messages the mail carriers and telegraph messengers brought to Governor-elect Franklin Murphy yesterday from all parts of the state and country, none was read with more interest or answered with greater promptness and pleasure than that which conveyed to the victor in Tuesday's struggle the kindly congratulations of his late opponent.

During the campaign Mr. Murphy and Mayor Seymour met twice, and the same spirit of friendliness that marked their correspondence characterized the correspondence that passed between them yesterday. Mayor Seymour's letter was as follows:

"Allow me to congratulate you upon your election. Your own personal character, the thorough organization and unanimity of your party, have been powerful factors to bring about this result. I wish you all success in the administration of the high office to which you have been elected.

To this Mr. Murphy replied immediately in this manner: "I thank you sincerely for your kindly word of congratulation upon my election. It is unfortunate for our personal hopes that in a campaign such as has just closed but one candidate can succeed, but I am glad to know that nothing has occurred in the campaign to disturb the friendly relations that have existed between us for so many years. With best personal wishes, I remain,

"The part played by Major Lentz in the Essex campaign has come in for considerable comment and eulogy since the vote was announced. The county committee chairman's prediction was that the county would give 10,000 Republican majority. The fact that the average plurality of the Republican assemblymen exceeded 12,000 has added not a little to the major's fame as a political prophet, and the major has not been forgotten in the exchange of post-election correspondence. His mail this morning brought him the following:

"My Dear Major:—Now that the campaign is over and the victory is so splendidly won, I want to thank you for your efficient and consistent support. I think there has never been a time in your career as a political leader in Essex county where your masterfulness and your confidence have been of such service as in this campaign. It has undoubtedly strengthened your hold upon the people, and while this is so, and I am glad to know that it is so, I want you to know that I appreciate greatly the fact that you have loyally given me your support and have left nothing undone that could contribute to my success.

"My Dear Major Lentz:—I wish to congratulate you upon the splendid triumph of our party in Essex county yesterday and to testify, as one Republican, to the value which is due to your personal effort and the magnificent organization which has been created by the committee under your direction.—Believe me, yours very truly, "JOHN F. Reynolds, the "Breakfast Chicken," was sent up for forty days. John Bergen, a farmer charged with drunkenness, was allowed to go.

William Huber, a young man who is the victim of a loathsome disease, was picked up by the police again yesterday. There was no place to send him but to jail. Neither of the hospitals will receive him.

New Italian Battleship. Naples, Nov. 7.—The new battleship Benedetto Brin, of 13,477 metric tons displacement and a speed of 20 knots an hour, was launched today at Castellamare. King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helene were present.

A CANVAS TENT FOR SMALLPOX PATIENTS.

Health Board Driven to the Last Resort in Housing Victims of the Disease.

Newark, Nov. 7.—On account of the recent rapid increase in the number of smallpox cases, and the fact that the isolation hospital is now overcrowded with patients, Health Officer Chandler today made arrangements to have a large canvas tent erected on the grounds of the institution within the next twenty-four hours. It will be used to accommodate the convalescent patients, who will be removed from the main building in order that new cases may receive proper treatment.

Mr. Chandler says he has been forced to take this step because he has found it absolutely necessary for public safety. The tent, however, is to be only a temporary affair, for the health officer expects to have three portable buildings sufficient to accommodate fifty or more patients, erected instead, within ten days or less.

A special meeting of the board of health was held at noon today and the propositions approved. At tonight's meeting of the common council the board of health will make a request for \$5,000, so that the project may be carried to completion at the earliest moment possible.

There is but little doubt, it is said, that the appropriation will be granted. The long delay in securing a site for the proposed new \$20,000 hospital for contagious diseases, plans for which have been approved by the board of health, is held to be responsible for present conditions. Efforts have been made for the past six months by the board to secure a proper site, but all were balked by objections from property owners and others.

Thirteen new cases of smallpox were reported at the health office for the twenty-four hours ending yesterday. Three more were reported this morning. All the patients have been removed to the isolation hospital, and this jumped the number of patients there to sixty-three.

This number is far beyond the normal capacity of the institution, which is about fifty. It caused much perturbation of mind to Health Officer Chandler and Dr. H. C. Herold, president of the board of health. They held several consultations over the matter, and the erection of the tent and portable building was practically decided on.

When the health officer was asked today how the accommodations were for patients at the isolation hospital, he said: "The hospital is like a trolley car. There is always room for one more. We are crowded beyond our limits, but are taking good care of every one."

Further than this Mr. Chandler would not speak. The tent which it is proposed to erect will be about thirty feet square. Asked how the occupants would be cared for in it in view of the cold weather, Mr. Chandler said he received a guarantee from the man who expects will put it up that it can be heated as comfortably as any building.

Portable buildings like those proposed by the health authorities are quite common in the West. The kind it is hoped to have erected here will be like those used by the United States army during the Spanish war. Three days after the order is sent the tents may be shipped and it can be put together in a day or two at the longest. It will be of frame and corrugated iron construction.

The new cases of smallpox reported today were Eliza Simmons, fifty-six years of age, of 8 Oriental place; Nellie Frances, forty years old, of 102½ Pennington street, and Annie Lee, twenty-nine years, of 89 Somerset street.

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
