RIDER NOTES: THE EUROPEAN GENERATIONS

The present article, of interest to all descendants of Samuel Rider of Yarmouth 1639 and Plymouth, is an attempt to clarify and correct certain notions about the Rider ancestry as well as to trace the English origins of the family.

The uncalendared deed in the possession of the Northampton Public Library (England--see New England Hist. and Geneal. Register 79:316) states Samuel Ryder Jr. "reputed sonne of Samuel Ryder Sr. sometimes lived in the Towne of Northampton in the County of Northampton in the Parish of Allhallowes in Old England, and the said Samuel Ryder Junir hath lived with his said father in the Township of Yarmouth in the jurisdiction of Plymouth." In the summer of 1966 I visited Yarmouth, Barnstable County, Massachusetts, in the hope of discovering ruins of the Samuel Rider homestead near Follins Pond with the aid of a copy of a 1644 map of Yarmouth published in Charles F. Swift's History of Old Yarmouth 1639-1884. The map shows the location of

Samuel Rider's house along with those of some twenty other early settlers. Foundations of a Quaker meeting house built in 1659 were evident, but underbrush was too thick to make my amateur archaeological quest very fruitful. However, I think I have discovered the general location of the house near a dried-up swamp on the northeast shore of Follins Pond about three hundred yards from the Mayfair Road.

The name Rider is of infrequent occurrence in the County of Northampton, England. The baptismal records of Allhallowes Parish, Northampton, have been examined from 1590 to 1610 with no references to the name Rider found. However, on 16 Oct. 1628, we find Samuel Ryder married there Anne Gamlett, and on 4 June 1629 their daughter Jane was baptized. On 25 Nov. 1632 Samuel, son of Samuel Ryder laborer and Anne his wife, was baptized.

The will of John Smith of Kingsthorpe, yeoman, dated 7 Oct. 1637, proved 4 Dec. 1637 [Archdeaconry of Northampton, series 2, H:263] contains a bequest to "Samuell Rider my godson, the son of Samuel Rider of Northampton" of the house wherein Smith dwelt, etc. The inventory of John Smith's goods was witnessed by Samuel Rieder who signed it. A conveyance was made 20 March 15 Chas. II (i.e. 1663) by "Samuel Rider of Plymouth in New England, yeoman, son of Samuel Rider heretofore of the Town of Northampton, moulster, to William Butlyn of Kingsthorpe, miller, for £51.4s.0d. of a messuage in Kingsthorpe now occupied by Elenor Hancorne, widow, and a lea of ground shooting against a close belonging to the messuage which said premises were given to the said Samuel Rider by the last will of John Smith." The deed is signed with the mark of the grantor: **2R** (Northamptonshire Record Office: NPL 812). Samuel¹ Rider seems to have been in Kingsthorpe as late as December 1637. He may have mortgaged the property to raise enough money with which to emigrate. It would seem John Smith was related in some way to Samuel Rider or he would not have left such a handsome legacy to his son. The will of John Smith of Kingsthorpe, yeoman, dated 7 Oct. 1637, proved 1 Dec. 1637 (J. H. Glover, M.A., Vicar, ed., Kingsthorpiana, or researches in a Church Chest, being a calendar of old documents now existing in the Church chest of Kingsthorpe near Northampton [1883]) by the relict Elizabeth, is as follows:

To be buried in church or churchyard of Kingsthorpe; to every child of my brothers and sisters £1.6.8d: to children of Joseph Billingham of Kingsthorpe £20 equally divided; to children of Peter Billingham of Kingsthorpe 20/- each: to William Billingham eldest son of Jos. Billingham, all my arable land in the common fields of Kingsthorpe with furzes and bushes thereto belonging,

and cows' common belonging to the house I live in, to him and his heirs for ever, also that ancient chest which I bought before I was married; to Samuel Rider my godson son of Samuel Rider of Northampton the house I live in with yard, outhouses, etc. belonging and lee of grass that adjoins unto them upon the backside to him and his heirs for ever; to Thomas Jenewaie my godson the elder son of Thos Jeneway of Kingsthorpe, plot of furze that belongs to my dwelling (5 acres) being at the end of Frost Slade; to Jos. Billingham and his eldest son William all my wearing apparel except my new cloak to my wife; to the poor of Kingsthorpe 4/- a year to be paid them on the Feast of St. Thomas the Apostle for ever, by my wife during her life, and afterwards by William Billingham and Samuel Rider. The legacies of house and land to Wm Billingham, Samuel Rider and Thomas Jenewaie, were only to take effect after the death of John Smith's wife who was to enjoy them during her life. His wife Elizabeth was appointed full and sole executor, and residuary legatee. Thos Jenkinson neighbor and George Nelson kinsman, respectively of Kingsthorpe and Harlestone, were named overseers, to have 3/4d each; witnesses: George Nelson and Gregory Palmer. The attached inventory, coming to £156.4.4d., was taken by Walter Burnett, George Nelson, Joseph Billingham and Samuel Rider.

The original registers of All Saints Parish, Northampton, have been examined from the beginning in 1560 to 1642 and yield the following:

The following were examined without results: St. Giles Parish, Northampton, Copy Register, 1559-1642; St. Peter's Parish, Northampton, Copy Register, 1578-1642; Church of the Holy Sepulchre, Northampton, Copy Register, 1571-1642; Kingsthorpe Paris, Longden's extracts only, 1539-1632. Aside from the marriage, no record of the name Gamlett was found; it may have been Gauntlett or Gantlett.

In Carol G. Bonsey and J. G. Jenkins' Ship Money

Papers, recently published by the Buckinghamshire Record Society, a Francis Ryder is mentioned, either of Newport Pagnell of some village in the Newport Hundred, probably the former to judge from the names of other men mentioned with him. Complaint was made that he was only assessed at 7/- whereas it ought to have been 8/-. This Francis Ryder was the clue that led to a search of Phillimore's printed Marriages of Newport Pagnell. The library of the Bucks Archaeological Society at Aylesbury has a manuscript copy of the baptismal register. Burials were obtained from the Bishop's Transcripts at the Record Office, Aylesbury, missing for the earliest period and beginning in 1600. Transcripts of the marriages and baptisms have been collated with the printed and manuscript copies.

The Lay Subsidy Rolls for Bucks 1524 and 1525, printed by the Bucks Record Society, mention Richard Rider of Marsh End, Newport Pagnell, assessed on goods worth £1 for 1524 and Robert Rider of the same for £1 in 1525. The index to deeds in the Bucks Archaeological Society's collection mentions John Ryder senior who witnessed a deed at Newport Pagnell in 1433. No Riders were found in the Bucks Record Office. John Rider of 1433 was a substantial yeoman but the Richard and Robert of the Subsidy Rolls would seem to be smaller fry, perhaps labourers. The only will proved in the Bucks Archdeaconry Court under the name of Rider is that of Francis in 1637, not yet examined. He would seem to have been of higher social status than

the other Riders of that date, since he was the only one mentioned in the Ship Money Papers. Since the family goes back to at least 1433, there may not be a close relationship between the Riders appearing on the registers from 1564. Francis may have returned to Newport to purchase property.

The only Smith will with any connection with a Rider is that of Thomas Smith of Northampton, malster, dated 2 Aug. 1627, proved 1627 in Northampton Archdeaconry Court (2nd series M312):

To be buried in St. Giles of which parish I am a parishioner; my wife was made joint purchaser with me of my lands and tenements in Kingsthorpe and Northampton and consents to my bequests; to son John, lands, tenements and hereditaments in Kingsthorpe, and two houses in N'ton wherein widow Broxon and John Curryer dwell, at twenty years of age, and till then to have £30 put out at interest for him, failing him and his issue, then to Robert and Samuel the sons of my late brother Robert Smith, the said Robert and Samuel to pay to my cousin Edw. Burgh's three children, Elizabeth, Grace and Mary, £5 each; to son John also the house in N'ton wherein I now dwell, after my wife's decease, failing etc. to Robert and Samuel Smith; to my cousen Samuel Ryder £5 in two years after my decease; I forgive widow Broxon a quarter year's rent; residue to wife Agnes; witnessed by Edw. Burgh, Mathew Sillesbye and [almost defaced, looks like] John Smith of Kingsthorpe.

The word "cousin" at this period denoted usually a blood relationship of indirect nature such as nephew, less often grandson. That Thomas Smith was the father of the John whose will was abstracted above seems quite certain, but the latter alludes to all his brothers and sisters who do not appear in Thomas's will at all. He may have included his wife's brothers and sisters, but the absence of Robert and Samuel Smith in John's will is strange. Wills for widows Agnes and Elizabeth and Edw. Burgh have not been located. A Thomas Broxon was buried at Newport on 13 July 1634, and a widow Broxon was living in Thomas Smith's house at Northampton in 1627, not, of course, the widow of that Thomas. A John Smith applied for marriage license in 1627 and married Elizabeth Garratt, spinster, on 11 Oct. 1627, at Lamport (about 8 miles from Kingsthorpe). Newport Pagnell itself is a small market town on a main road about twelve miles from Northampton. The original Newport Pagnell registers have yet to be examined. They were loaned to the College of Arms by the Vicar in January 1966 for six months, and have not yet been returned.

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It will be seen from the preceding that Samuel¹ Rider of Yarmouth and Plymouth married Anne Gamlett [for references to her see Mayflower Descendant 11:49-51] who died in Plymouth, 14 Dec. 1695. Samuel's parents were John Ryder and Helen Smith. Samuel's grandparents may have been William Rydar and Alice England, and a William, Richard, Robert or Thomas, may have been his great-grandfather, but this is still to be proved and a matter of conjecture.
