campment of the G. A. R. at Lisbon, infor-
mation was received that in sections of the
state where there had been crop failures
many old soldiers and their families were
in destitute circumstances and needing re-
lief. They must have grain to seed their
land, and in some cases, feed for their stock
and provisions for their families. Their
land and stock having been mortgaged be-
fore, they have nothing which they can use
as security to obtain seed or food, and un-
less assisted by the generous or more for-
tunate sections of the state, must meet the
alternative of starvation or abandonment
of their homesteads.
